## *Back to Basics*



June is when our beardless varieties come into their own. You should expect to see a splendid show from your Siberian, Spuria, Louisiana, and Japanese varieties as the Tall Bearded varieties wind down.

It is also time to remove the spent bloomstalks from all your iris. We remove these for two reasons. 1) to reduce the risk of rot as the stalk disintegrates and 2) to remove any fertilized seed pods

from your garden.

While it is great fun to grow iris from seeds, we don't want those growing up in the middle of our known varieties.

Modern iris are what we call "hybrids" they are bred by strategically placing pollen from one variety on the reproductive parts of another. This "cross" results in off-spring of many different types and colors. These seedlings are then propagated clonally to maintain their unique

traits. You are actually harvesting "clones" when you divide the rhizomes in a clump. They have grown out from their "mother" and are genetically identical to her. Iris grown from seeds are genetically diverse and are never identical although they may look similar. These seedlings are usually the culprits when a patch of iris reportedly go "all purple or all yellow". So always vigilantly remove those stalks and pods!

## *In the June Garden*

It's time to :

- Remove spent bloomstalks at the base.
- Remove any foliage that becomes damaged or diseased. Watch for leaf spot and remove affected leaves, do not compost.
- Feed with a good 10-10-10 fertilizer after bloom has finished.
- Water reblooming varieties to encourage a second or third bloom cycle.
